KOREA 1950-53

At 4.00am June 25, 1950, the North Korean Peoples' Army crossed the 38th Parallel at several points and launched attacks on South Korea. A few hours later the Security Council of the United Nations met and adopted a resolution calling for the cessation of hostilities and withdrawal

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of North Koreans to the 38th Parallel. After two days, during which no such action was taken the Council met again and called on member nations for assistance. At it's third meeting on June 30, President Truman reported that the US Airforce and certain ground forces were ordered into action. The Australian Government agreed to provide immediate air and naval support, and on July 2, No.77 Squadron RAAF began operations against North Korea from air fields in Japan. On July 27 it was announced that a special army force for service in Korea would be raised. Recruiting started immediately, and volunteers were called from members of the British Commonwealth Occupation Force serving in Japan. The Third Battalion, the Royal Australian Regiment, which was based at Hiro in Japan, although under strength, was at a high degree of efficiency and underwent an immediate

intensive training programme to fit itself for actual battle. The Special Force volunteers in Australia, mostly all exservicemen with infantry experience, trained intensively at Ingleburn NSW and Puckapunyal Vic, and were flown by commercial airlines to reinforce the Battalion in Japan, as they too, conditioned themselves against the rigors of service life and training. The Battalion assembled in Japan under the command of Lt Col C.H. Green, DSO. On September 27th the Battalion sailed for Korea, arriving at Pusan, Korea, on the 28th, and on October 2nd, made their first operational patrols in the Songju-Waegwan area. Several days later the Battalion suffered their first casualties when "C" Coy 2IC and his driver were killed when their carrier drove into an unmarked mine field. In the course of the next three years, Battalions of the Royal Australian Regiment were to serve with distinction in

Korea. The most outstanding action was on the eve of the 36th Anniversary of Gallipoli, when at Kapyong, Korea, the Third Battalion Royal Australian Regiment were awarded the United States Presidential Citation for their part in halting the advance of the Communist Chinese Army and adverting a possible major disaster to the United States Eighth Army. The citation is a unique honour insofar that this is the first Australian Army Unit to receive a unit decoration or award. By order of His late Majesty, King George VI, the emblem of the award is worn on both upper sleeves of the uniform. The members of the battalion actually present at the battle of Kapyong will wear the emblem "in perpetuo", irrespective of the units in which they eventually serve. And as long as the 3 RAR exists, its members will be entitled to wear the emblem whilst serving with the battalion.
